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Funds for Lawrence Schools Grow Faster than Enrollment *Enrollment up 8 percent, Funding up 85 percent*

(WICHITA) – School funding has been the topic of political conversation around Kansas this legislative session. While we have not yet seen the final resolution of the funding debate, policy makers and the public should step back and appreciate how much financial support the public has already given to schools.

A new policy brief from the Flint Hills Center for Public Policy examines taxpayer support for Lawrence Public Schools (USD 497) since 1993, and finds that while enrollment in the district is up, funding is up much more. Read more about [this policy brief](#) at www.flinthills.org.

“Student enrollment in USD 497 has increased 7.6 percent since 1993,” says John R. LaPlante, education policy fellow of the Wichita-based think tank. “Its total funding has increased 85 percent. Per-pupil spending is up slightly less at 72 percent.”

For the 2003-2004 school year, per-pupil spending was \$9,477.

We all want the best possible education for Kansas children; however, the current system is not taking us there. Let’s not blame the legislators, then, if they are reluctant to escalate spending levels even more. It’s time that the public, and students themselves, receive the benefits of fostering increased competition through family choice.
